gine anything beyond today's meal or tomorrow's bleak reality.

ICCM is working to change that!



A recent study regarding the viability of international Christian child sponsorship, led by Bruce Wydick, professor of economics

University of San Francisco, indicates that a sister sponsorship program significantly impacts life outcomes for children:

- They stay in school longer than their non-sponsored peers
- They are much more likely to finish high school
- They are much more likely to complete a university education

- They are more likely to have salaried employment and more likely to secure white-collar employment
- They are more likely to become community leaders
- They are more likely to become church leaders

According to Wydick, "One of the key factors in the program's success is that they help broaden the children's aspirations and view of themselves."\*

As ICCM's Latin American Regional Coordinator, I get to witness this happening in real life! Local project leaders are helping children recognize their capabilities, develop their potential and shape their aspirations and life goals. Our sponsored children begin to see beyond the norm of not finishing school, for example, and begin to envision how they can fully make use of the gifts they've been given to serve others.

Formerly sponsored children, according to the study,



specify two aspects of the program as being the most beneficial: spiritual and character-building. It makes a big difference for children to understand they are made in the image of the Creator, that all humans possess

inherent dignity and worth, that we are beings with a transcendent destiny, beings of purpose, reason and creativity and able to make free choices.

Thus, it may not come as a surprise to know that ICCM alumni around the world include not only a bishop and a superintendent, but pastors, doctors, nurses, school directors, teachers, missionaries, a mayor and a member of Parliament.

Eunice works closely alongside our Ecuador ICCM National Coordinator, María Belén Mejía, to help the program

reach its full potential.

Regularly witnessing the positive, far-reaching effects that Christian sponsorship has on children, I am no longer surprised when a current leader tells me, "I was sponsored as a child."

ICCM walks alongside children, helping them grow physically, academically, emotionally, socially, spiritually.
