2019 Liberia

Brooke Hills Free Methodist Church (BHFMC) first made its connection with the Free Methodist Church (FMC) in Liberia, Africa, in 2012. Working closely with Africa Area Director Mike Reynen, ICCM Regional Coordinator Vickie Reynen and Liberian National Mission Director Leader Rev. Rufus Kahn, BHFMC was able to extend outside of normal church operations and work alongside the local church in Grand Bassa County to see the dream of a school come to fruition. This work, which led to the construction and implementation of the Zuezohn School, provided the opportunity for local children to receive a thorough, Christian based, education. interact with the Zuezohn School, teachers, students, and families. BHFMC wanted to reassure all of them of its continued support, prayers and connection.



Zuezohn School has grown immensely since its opening in 2016. There are

currently 120 students attending. Thirty-three of those students are sponsored by BHFMC families.

John H. Westerhoff, III, in his book *Will Our Children Have Faith?*, reminds the church of its duty: "Christ calls His church to be a community of change, to act with God in transforming the world into the community of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. As a Christian faith community, we engage in personal, interpersonal, and social actions."

In February 2019, a BHFMC team of five travelled to Liberia to participate in the sixth Annual Free Methodist Church Conference. This trip was a little different from previous trips. Because of leadership transition at BHFMC, the new pastors, Steven Hlatky and Linda Corle, went to meet with Rev. Kahn and the churches, and to
