Eden is the youngest of nine children. She grew up in Smokey Mountain Village in Butuan City, Philippines. Smokey Mountain Village is the garbage dump, named for constantly smoking trash.

Eden's life was changed when Willy Abrao of Ahon Ministries, an ICCM project, started visiting her house. (Ahon Ministries focuses on holistic child development for children who live at the garbage dump.) When Eden was 10, she joined Ahon Ministries and was sponsored through ICCM. At the age of 13, she became a Christian. Eden said, "God set aside my problems and gave me peace



in my heart. Through the love of God, I changed." Eden is the only believer in her family and the only one of her siblings to continue her education.

As a high school student, Eden fasted and prayed, seeking direction for her future. God revealed He wanted

Eden to be a pastor. At first, she protested. But, after reading 2 Timothy 4, she was convinced it was His plan.

"I give you this charge: Preach the word; be prepared in season ..." (2 Timothy 4:1b-2a).

Eden's life has been transformed. Her family no longer lives at the dump. She is a student at Light and Life Bible College in Butuan City. She is thankful for God's work in her life, the Ahon staff, the Bible college staff and her ICCM sponsors.
